- Develop and discuss changing social values in a safe and non-judgmental environment.

 - Partnership possibilities expanded beyond stereotypes from '50s and '60s
- Recall changes in society
 - Gender roles
 - Reassessing historically significant monuments (streets, sports names, etc.)
- Discuss impact of changes in media, technology, fashion, music and other aspects of popular culture
 - Computers
 - Phones
 - Modes of music transmission (turntables, CDs, MP3, etc.)

- Social values
 - Changing moral standards
