Student Learning Outcomes

- The student will design goals for a community dental health program.
- The student will develop objectives which include all essential components for a community dental health program.

Description

Continuation of D H 326A. Emphasis on the steps to developing community dental health programs, including health promotion programs. Local, state, and federal departments of public health services, types of fluoridation, and school-based dental health programs and screenings. Evidence-based decision making will be applied to the dental public health setting. Intended for students in the Dental Hygiene Baccalaureate Degree Program; enrollment is limited to students accepted in the program.

Course Objectives

The student will be able to:

- Describe successful public health programs.
- Identify dental health problems and develop programs to address those problems.
- Discuss research on a dental public health topic.
- Differentiate between health care delivery systems.
- Understand and apply the principles of law and ethics to the practice of dental public health.

Course Content

E. Law and ethics (Lec)
