- Construct conditional statements and suppositions. State and support one's opinions. Analyze different aspects of human life and construct comparative/superlative statements.
- Analyze human speech and literally creations, summarize and retell stories orally and in writing, including direct and indirect quotations in the past and present tenses.

Description

Further development of material presented in JAPN 1 & 2. Oral and written practice in competencies in language functions: vocabulary essential to daily communicative situations, grammar necessary for carrying out various functions, signals for carrying out communicative tasks, and cultural skills in specific situations. Distinguishing formal and informal styles, and using honorifics. Making suppositions. Additional 120 Kanji pronunciation and recognition.

Course Objectives

The student will be able to:

- 1. Construct conditional statements and make suppositions.
- 2. Produce sentences, orally and in writing, based on vocabulary and functions presented in class.
- 3. Express desires, intentions and conjectures.
- Summarize and retell stories orally and in writing, including direct and indirect quotations in the past and present tenses.
- Demonstrate knowledge of common stereotypes of Japanese cultures, and those of American culture that the Japanese have; and recognize differences in behavior, thinking, traditions and values.
- 6. Identify and recognize some 320 characters.

Course Content

 - a. Making conditional statements and suppositions (tara/ plain nonpast form + to)
- Produce sentences, orally and in writing, based on vocabulary and functions presented in class

- a. Plain past forms and plain negative forms
- Comparing two and/or more items/persons/places, and superlative statements
- c. Nominalizers and a pseudo-noun "no"
- d. The conjunctive -tara form
- e. Adverbial use of adjectives
- f. Suggestion: -ta/-nai houga ii
- g. Qualifying nouns with verbs and adjectives
- h. Explanatory ending: -n desu
- i. Describing necessity and obligations: -nakute wa naranai
- j. Describing symptoms and understanding common phrases used at a clinic
- k. Using public transportation
- 3. Express desires, intentions and conjectures
 - a. Talking about future plans
 - b. Expressing desires using "-tai" forms
 - c. Describing one's intentions
- Summarize and retell stories orally and in writing, including direct and indirect quotations in the past and present tenses.
 - Summarizing and describing symptoms to get medical attention and treatment
 - Summarizing and retelling past experiences, current situations and future changes
- Demonstrate knowledge of common stereotypes of Japanese cultures, and those of American culture that the Japanese have; and recognize differences in behavior, thinking, traditions and values
 - a. Distinguishing formal and informal speech styles
 - b. Expressing concerns and empathy
 - c. Complimenting
 - d. Socializing and small talks
 - e. Expressions of humbleness
- 6. Identify and recognize some 320 characters
 - a. Read and write sentences using 320+ Kanji
